We welcomed several exceptional year-round staff members whose contributions, combined with the commitment of our artists, board, and volunteers, are positioning Watershed for continued growth.





WELCOME TO THE COMMONS



In 2024, Watershed's artists-in-residence were the inaugural cohort to break bread in our new Commons building.

Designed by architect Jane Gleason and built by the incredible team at JF Scott Construction, Watershed's resident-life building boasts a large, open-concept communal dining/living room and a screened-in porch perfect for enjoying food, coffee, and conversation; an ADA-accessible artist's suite which houses, among others, our annual Salad Days artist for seven months of the year; and a commercial kitchen named in honor of our beloved former executive director, Fran Rudoff.

At the entrance to the Commons is *Big Blue*, a large, deeply carved, architectonic sculpture created in 1984 by artist Arnie Zimmerman and generously donated by his wife, Ann Rosenthal.

Arnie passed away in 2021, and, as Watershed cofounder Chris Gustin writes, Ann's generosity "celebrates Arnie's early residencies at Watershed in the '80s, when he helped pass the word that there was this incredible place in Maine where artists could come together and make work amongst peers. It is fitting that his energy and spirit will live on to all who visit. ... Arnie will be forever missed."

In 2024, Watershed welcomed 123 artists from 34 different countries and states to our 54-acre campus in rural Maine.

We follow a unique model for artist residencies: organizing artists develop themes and invite a small group of artists to anchor two-week sessions; additional artists with similar interests then apply to join. When the group of twelve to eighteen artists converge at Watershed, they are given uninterrupted time to focus on their creative practice in our state-of-the-art Windgate Studio.

During their residencies, artists are nourished with delicious, chef-prepared communal meals featuring local ingredients. They relish in the bucolic nature of our space, surrounded by farms, fields, and woods; swimming in lakes and the ocean; and soaking up the starry skies.

In this way—artists driving the content, with no requirement put upon them during their stay—Watershed provides a place where artists are free to play, explore, and ideate. It is process over product; it is genuine connection over “connection.” Over and over, we hear experiencing this freedom and being in community simultaneously results in a transformation. New ideas and directions are built, lifelong networks are created, and the most pressing concerns of the ceramics field are given voice.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Watershed's mission is to provide artists with time and space to explore ideas with clay. Our aim is to make this available to all artists. **Forty percent of every artist's residency is subsidized by our generous supporters.**

In 2024, with your support, we furthered that commitment and gave 13 full scholarships and 4 partial scholarships to artists, for a total of \$35,200 in awards. Of these 17 recipients, 8 identified as artists of color and 6 were from other underrepresented and/or queer communities.

Watershed wants to make residency experiences accessible to all artists! Together, we can change the future of the field. K-12 & PUBLIC WORKSHOPS



Workshops are a core program at Watershed, offering small group lessons concentrated on a specific ceramic subject in an exceptional studio with equally exceptional teaching artists.

As a nonprofit steeped in the core value of diversity, we actively pursue multigenerational, multicultural teaching artists, fostering an environment in which different perspectives—from across cultures, identities, and experiences—flourish. Our intention is to connect the public to the contemporary practices of artists working in clay, inspiring creativity, craftsmanship, and appreciation of the arts.

Thanks to our generous donors, we are able to subsidize workshops with up to a 79% discount for any K-12 staff working in Maine. Watershed's K-12 workshops served 60+ educators from 40+ schools across Maine in 2024.

These teachers' participation in our hands-on workshops goes on to impact thousands of students in our state annually, strengthening their ceramics knowledge and crafting the next generation of clay-based artists.

Partnerships are an essential strategic component of our work—and to creating a welcoming community in which creativity blossoms. With such a long history of operating collaboratively and with integrity to our values, Watershed is well-known for authentic partnerships, which then channels even more collaboration and bridge-building.

Here is just a small sample of our partnership work in 2024:

- Collaborating with the **Maine Department of Education, Maine Art Education Association**, and the **Maine Arts Commission** to connect with K-12 art educators in Maine
- Strengthening ties to the national K-12 Clay organization
- Serving as the year-round fiscal sponsor for **The Color Network**
- Partnering with ceramics faculty at **Maine College of Art and Design**: sharing visiting teaching artists, having Associate Professor Patrick Coughlin on our board, and exhibiting the work of MECA&D alumni, faculty, and current ceramics students
- Donating ceramic artwork to an auction benefit for **Veggies to Table**, a local, organic, nonprofit farm; and secondhand cabin equipment to **Maine Audubon's Hog Island** camp and **Habitat for Humanity's ReStore**
- Working with **Maine Association of Nonprofits, Cultural Alliance of Maine**, and others on advocacy
- Continuing to play a part in **Maine Craft Association's Maine Craft Weekend** and hosting the 2024 Maine Craft Apprenticeship Program Capstone exhibition

THE COLOR NETWORK RESIDENCY

In September, twelve artists from The Color Network (TCN) gathered at Watershed for a two-and-a-half-week residency to work in clay and build connections through a mentorship program. TCN supports and advances ceramic artists of color by creating opportunities for dialogue, networking, professional development, visibility, and resources via an international network among experienced and emerging ceramicists.

With TCN mentors and mentees scattered geographically, their residency at Watershed offers time to connect in person and foster deeper connections, building both community and creative practices.

The Color Network's residency was supported in part by the Maxwell/Hanrahan Foundation and the National Endowment for the Arts.





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
